Please Help Save Your Staff's Sanity

We're not significantly larger in numbers than we were a few years ago, but as an institution in challenging times, we're far more complex than we used to be. With so many active ministries and so much going on in and around the building, we're bound to have the occasional miscommunication, toes inadvertently stepped on, even an out-of-joint nose or two.

So as we go into our new year together, here are some suggestions (we wouldn't dare call them commandments!) to help us all keep things running smoothly.

- 1. Thou shalt check the Online Calendar (<u>www.uusg.org/calendar</u>) when planning any event.
- Thou shalt confer with the Congregational Administrator regarding the availability of a room or rooms, submit the appropriate Room Request Form (<u>www.uusg.org/room-request-form/</u>), and be sure thou art indeed cleared for the calendar before beginning to publicize any event, meeting, conference, party, or other gathering of persons in the shared spaces of our buildings.
- 3. Thou shalt honor the non-working hours of our staff and keep them holy. In any emergency outside of office hours, the person to call is our Senior Minister. She's the one who signed on to be on call 24/7.
- 4. Thou shalt avail thyself of the rich trove of information regarding activities, starting times, contacts, schedules, staff hours, and staff time off available through our website (<u>www.uusg.org</u>), our Pioneer newsletter, and our Mini-Pioneer bulletin, as well as the various bulletin boards in the Common Room and the Heritage Room at the 110 S. 2nd Street entrance.
- 5. Thou shalt read the Weekly E-Blast (<u>www.uusg.org/weekly-email</u>) from UUSG and any special e-mailings that may emanate from the Church Office. These missives will often answer questions you didn't know you had.
- 6. Thou shalt honor the Senior Minister's reserved parking place at all hours, every day of the week. She comes and goes at unscheduled times and needs to know she has a place to park.
- 7. If there is a problem or a misunderstanding, thou shalt go directly to the person or persons involved and work it out. If thou canst not do that, thou shalt go to the Senior Minister. If thou canst not do *that,* thou shalt

Habitat and YRUU Kick-off Meeting

Everyone (but particularly Junior High and YRUU students and their parents) is invited to a special kick-off meeting on Sunday, September 28 at 12:30pm.

The meeting will begin with a potluck, and then the HFH youth and advisors will tell us about their successful house project this past July.

Afterward, advisors will explain to students and parents our YRUU programming for this year. Parental participation is a requirement for a successful YRUU year, and you will have an opportunity to ask questions and sign up to support the program.

Religious Education Curriculum

<u>Pre-K Group (year prior to Kindergarten)</u> We Are Many, We Are One: This yearlong preschool curriculum offers children the grounding of a religious community and tradition, along with the freedom to discover and express their uniqueness.

Primary Group (Grades K, 1, 2)

Stories About God: Looks at "God" as a central symbol for understanding human religiousness. This liberal and eclectic theology is story-based and covers three themes: (1) God is a oneness that can take many forms, (2) God is love and worth that can take many forms, and (3) God is mystery that can take many forms. Theism and atheism are both addressed, as are the spiritual and theological needs of young children.

Elementary Group (Grades 3, 4, 5)

Holidays and Holy Days: In this program, participants learn about the origins and meanings of holiday and holy day celebrations. They will also explore the Holidays and Holy Days other cultures and religions celebrate.

Junior High Group (Grades 6, 7, 8)

Building Bridges: This yearlong curriculum helps youth learn about their own faith and other faith traditions through interactive experiences such as field trips and interviews.


YRUU (Grades 9, 10, 11, 12)

Youth and adult advisors work together to build community, develop youth leadership, and engage in worship and social action. Our youth develop ties to our area congregations and wider UU youth movement by attending district YRUU conferences.

Friday Flick: Unacceptable Levels

At 7pm on Friday, September 26, our free monthly film series will show *Unacceptable Levels*, an important 2013 documentary designed to help us protect ourselves from serious diseases caused by synthetic chemicals affecting our bodies.

We have approximately 200 synthetic industrial chemicals interacting with our cells every single day. To explore different facets of common chemical exposure, this documentary was made in consultation with experts in multiple fields and is guided by a father on a personal journey to bring these issues to light for everyone.

The film's primary goal? To determine whether we can prevent disease before it strikes us.

A Mesmerizing Opportunity

a Message from the Rev. Dr. Lindsay Bates

I love hypnosis. Love doing it, love using it, love being in trance. I've been using hypnotism in my pastoral work since 1995, when I earned my basic certification from the National Guild of Hypnotists, the largest hypnosis organization in the world (there are about 15,000 of us scattered about the continents).

Since then I've continued my studies, earning Advanced Hypnotist and (most recently) Board Certified Consulting Hypnotist credentials. I'm a Past President of the Guild's Clergy Special Interest Group and co-author of our Spiritual Hypnotism curriculum.

This part of my ministry is why I'm off to Marlboro, Massachusetts every summer for a week-long convention of seminars, workshops, and lectures on every aspect of hypnosis research, theory, and practice. This year I presented a workshop on how our Last Tuesday program works, and had a full class of ten interested colleagues. Fun and gratifying!

Are you curious about hypnotism? Do you wonder what it feels like to be hypnotized? Would you like to learn to use hypnotism to meet personal goals of self-improvement, selfunderstanding, habit-alteration, increased self-confidence, and relaxation?

Sound too good to be real? Think you'd like to find out? Then join me on Tuesday, September 23, from 7pm until about 9pm in the Common Room for an "Introduction to Hypnotism" program.

You'll learn what hypnosis is, what it isn't, how it can be used, why it works, and what hypnotic trance feels like, as well as learning an "anchoring" gesture you'll be able to use to help vourself feel calm and relaxed even in the most stressful situations. You'll also be eligible to join our Last Tuesday Group Hypnotic Induction sessions, starting up again on September 30.
