From the Pulpit the Rev. Dr. Lindsay Bates

We're all familiar with the concept of a Covenant, I hope - we do, after all, speak our UUSG Covenant together every Sunday morning and at the start of most of our formal meetings. It's a statement not of what we believe (in fact, we explicitly agree to disagree), but rather of how we intend to act together, promoting practical goodness, aiding each other in our moral and religious improvement, being seekers after truth and goodness. It's pretty general, and it doesn't spell out in any detail just how we will do these things. Still, it's a good guide. Members of this congregation will take action to help the world and to help each other as we strive for greater understanding and greater goodness than we have yet achieved.

When our UUA MidAmerica Region staff person Lisa Presley was with us in October, she stressed the value of covenants for smaller groups that work together regularly. It's helpful to develop together a clear statement of what we need and expect from one another, what we will promise one

another, how we will develop our relationships with one another as we do the institutional and relational work of UUSG. It's been an interesting process. The groups that have completed their covenantal agreements will, I hope, share them with others so we all have a better understanding of how we expect to treat others and to be treated ourselves within our UUSG community.

Your core staff – professional and support – spent several weeks working on a Covenant that we will honor in our work with one another. It all seems like common sense ~ but if things get difficult, it's good to have our specific promises to one another to hold us together. With Staff Appreciation Sunday coming up on the 31st, we thought you might like to see what our Covenant looks like. It's how we agree to treat one another – and how all our UUSG community, I'm sure, would also like to be treated.

UUSG Staff Covenant December 15, 2015

As the core staff of the Unitarian Universalist Society of Geneva, this is our covenant:

We will honor confidences expressed in staff interactions, respecting both the privacy of each other and of church members/friends.

We will respect each other's competence, do our jobs to the best of our ability, and recognize that others are doing their best as well. We will address issues as they arise instead of waiting for them to build to unacceptable levels.

We will be generous with forgiveness when errors or missteps are made. We will be patient with one another, especially in times of stress.

We will support each other by asking for help when needed, offering help when appropriate, and maintaining a sense of humor.

We will attempt to communicate clearly, and to keep lines of communication between and among staff members open and clear. New ideas will be treated with appreciation and respect.

We will present a united front, even when that means respecting decisions that we may not agree with.

We will remember that we serve a diverse congregation and may not be able to meet everyone's needs at all times. To the best of our ability, we commit to serving the values and vision of this congregation and of Unitarian Universalism as we go about our work.



Scott's REgards the Rev. Scott Talbot Lewis

When I was a freshman in high school, a girl who'd been in the school play invited me to a party at her house. This girl was not one of those popular young ladies, but more someone who tended to fade into the woodwork, but I wasn't exactly the class president either, so I accepted.

When I got to the party, there was a girl there who I didn't care for, to put it diplomatically. She was the type who always belittled others, me included. With her were two of her cronies who were her back-up. (Did you see 'Mean Girls"?)

Well, the party was dragging, we were low on chips, and 3 Dog Night was playing when this odd-looking woman came lumbering up the hallway and into the kitchen. With slurred speech, she began talking with our hostess and it became obvious she was the girl's mother. I'll never forget what the girl said: "Mama, did you take pills again?" She began crying hysterically, but I was concerned for the mother. If we were going to avoid catastrophe, somebody had to do something.

Not typically the "take charge" type, I found the phone and phone book and called for an ambulance, pronto. Simultaneously, I could see the

"mean girl" out of the corner of my eye, she was calming the daughter down and helping them to find coats and purses and handkerchiefs. The guests, though there weren't many, were rallying to help. When the ambulance arrived, the girl and her mother were taken away to the hospital. I don't know what else happened, but the mean girl and I jumped into my car and drove to the hospital. Her two sidekicks jumped into the back seat and we were gone!

All that evening, the four of us worked together, helping and providing moral support for our friend. As I sat in that cold and ugly waiting room, I was baffled by the whole situation. Were the mean girls and I cooperating and working together? Crisis makes for surprising resourcefulness and collaborations.

None of us really qualify as mean girls, and our troubles are rarely so dramatic! With Michelle Gibson's resignation, we've lost a talented and important staff member. But we'll pull together and make it work! So many people have stepped forward to pitch in and take up the work, I'm really grateful. Our wonderful LRE teachers and facilitators are so very appreciated. Jodi Brown, Jenny Montgomery, and other members of our LRE Team have provided help, advice, and support. Thanks to all of you.

Wow! It's great to be part of the UUSG community.

The sessions are facilitated by members of the Membership Team and will include presentations by our minister and other church members.



Friday Flick: "Intersexion"

Join us for an LGBTQ-focused film on Friday, February 26 at 7pm.

Intersex is the term for a condition whereby a person has ambiguous sexual anatomy. The film "Intersexion" sets out to de-mystify intersex, looking beyond the shame and secrecy that defines many intersex births.

Interviewing intersex people around the world, the film explores how they navigate their way through childhood, adolescence, relationships, and adulthood when they don't fit the binary model of a solely male and female world.

It also sheds light on our culture and how it dictates gender roles without allowing for ambiguity. This film is sponsored by the UUSG <u>Interweave</u> <u>Group</u>.

(UUSG's Green Sanctuary Team buys wind energy matching 100% of our monthly Com Ed use, through Community Energy, from various wind farms. That energy goes to the grid, replacing energy from coal-fired plants, and considerably reduces pollution and water waste!)

But each of our households can add to this eco-impact by additionally buying inexpensive energy blocks ourselves from Community Energy, representing a percent of our household's bill (up to 100%). Find out how

We're already planning a very green UUSG Earth Month. 
