course, is that you come to us directly – but we understand that that isn't always easy. So please know that you can always talk to MOM...

But you can also always talk with us clergy!

Many years ago, the Rev. Peter Lee Scott came up with a list of "When to Call the Minister." It's gone through many revisions as time has passed; here's one of the more recent iterations, adapted from the newsletter of the UU Congregation of Gwinnett in Lawrenceville GA, with some changes to match our Geneva possibilities:

- You don't know Rev. Scott or Rev. Lindsay, but would like to.
- You are upset with one of us, or would like to express appreciation.
- You have religious or spiritual or ethical or moral questions.
- You are seeking to deepen your spiritual practices.
- You would like to request prayers or Reiki for yourself or for a friend or member of your family who is in need of comfort and healing energy.
- You're dealing with a challenge that hypnotism might help you overcome

- and you'd like to work with Rev. Lindsay.
- You have problems with your job, children, marriage, parents, school, or anything else where a listening ear might help you sort through the issues.
- You are going to the hospital, having surgery, find out you have a serious illness or condition, or know of someone else in the congregation dealing with these experiences.
 (Remember that hospitals can no longer legally notify us of your hospitalization; you must let us know yourself!)
- Someone close to you has died or is critically ill or you're dealing with a significant loss or transition of any kind.
- You are planning to be married, separated, or divorced.
- You or someone close to you is dealing with questions about sexual or gender identity.
- You would like your child dedicated in a special blessing ceremony.
- You are pregnant and glad you are, or you are and

- wish you weren't.
- You want to be pregnant but aren't, or you are considering adoption.
- You feel ready to join the congregation, or have questions about membership.
- You want to explore new ways to engage in congregational life.
- You have concerns or suggestions related to congregational life.
- You want to make a large donation to the church or remember the church in your will.
- Your life circumstances
 have changed and you
 want to be sure you still
 belong at UUSG. (Hint:
 You do. But if you want to
 talk about it, call one of
 us!)

I do understand the sacrifice that entails. Our church membership is comprised mainly of hardworking professionals who work long hours and savor our weekends as our time with family doing the things we enjoy. I get it! I feel the same way.


But our Board of Directors has laid down five goals for this year and to me the most important is: "Make a positive difference in our community." The program focuses on three main areas: youth development, parent support, and community education. We will be progressively more involved in that order as our ministry to the LGBTQ community grows and strengthens.






Would You Like Your Own Hymnal?

Tom Neilson Concert

On April 9 at 7:30pm, UUSG will again welcome Tom Neilson, a popular folk musician who performs political satire, parody, and general social commentary. The concert will be performed in the UUSG Sanctuary. Tickets may be purchased at the door and will cost \$20. Doors will open at 7pm.

Using humor, compassion, and outrage, Neilson will perform songs about a variety of themes concerning the world and the environment. As one reviewer noted, "No worthy cause goes unnoticed by Tom." Another commented, "the sophistication of his writing brings together some of the finest components of song and comedy, and has resulted in his winning several music awards."

Most recently, Neilson won an Independent Music Awards Song of the Year for his song about whistleblowing, "It's a Crime." The song is linked to on his website.

Known for his generous support of social change groups, Tom has agreed to donate proceeds from the concert to the Fox River Ecosystem Partnership, whose mission is to promote, preserve, protect, and enhance the natural, cultural, economic, and recreational resources of the Fox River Watershed.

Interweave is a local group of LGBTQ members, friends and allies who meet once a month to have time together for discussions and special events.


They will meet at 12:30pm on Sunday, April 17 to discuss a drop-in center for Youth Outlook and plan for their June picnic.

Along with the drumming experience, we expect to provide time for input





UUSG Turns 175!

Seems like only yesterday it was 1842 and we were a religiously diverse group of Geneva settlers, no more than a couple dozen folk, signing our assent to the original Covenant of the First Christian Congregation of Geneva. Now we're looking at our 175th Anniversary in June 2017.

Clearly, there must be a party!

Planning is beginning for special activities in the spring and early summer of 2017, and we need some more idea-folks and organizers and volunteers to help make things happen.

We've already got the Augustus Conant Pageant that Diane Handler created a few years ago lined up for the first weekend in June 2017. We're thinking it will happen on that Sunday morning, followed by our 175th Birthday Party.

Other ideas that have come up include a tea room during Swedish Days, docents in period costumes talking to visitors about our church's story during Swedish Days, a float in the Swedish Days Parade (since we're an important part of Geneva's story, maybe we could even arrange for Augustus Conant to be the Grand Marshall!).

March 8, 2016

- 1. The Board approved several changes to the Bylaws which will be voted on by the congregation at the Annual Meeting in May.
- 2. The Geneva Historical Museum has approached UUSG to be one of three Emergency Command Centers if disaster struck the Museum.
- 3. Kevin Beyer described what he and Lisa Gades have organized for several activities planned for the Day of Service and the help needed from the Board.
- 4. The Pledge Drive is starting soon and volunteers are needed to take a short Training session at 11:30am on Sunday the 13th or the 20th. A successful drive depends on all of us.
- 5. Kevin O'Neill presented the first draft of the 2016-17 budget with a large deficit that must be reduced by both more cuts and increase in revenue.
