April Friday Flick: The Reluctant Radical

If a crime is committed in order to prevent a greater crime, is it forgivable? Is it, in fact, necessary? *The Reluctant Radical* follows activist Ken Ward as he confronts his fears and puts himself in the direct path of the fossil fuel industry to combat climate change. The film reveals both the personal costs and also the fulfillment that comes from following one's moral calling- even if that means breaking the law. The film follows Ken through a series of direct actions, culminating with an action that shuts down all the U.S. tar sands oil pipelines and threatens to put him behind bars for 20 years. Ken Ward has no regrets, and his certainty leaves the audience to consider if he is out of touch with reality, or if it is the rest of society that is delusional for not acting when faced with the unsettling evidence that we are collectively destroying our world.

May Friday Flick: Served Like A Girl

Director Lysa Heslov's powerful documentary, *Served Like A Girl*, follows several American women who were wounded in action and are now

transitioning from soldier to civilian after serving their country in Iraq and Afghanistan. Struggling with PTSD, homelessness, broken families, divorce, serious illness, and military sexual abuse, these remarkable women harness humor to adapt to the emotional, social and economic challenges they face, through the Ms. Veteran America competition. Balancing beauty and brawn, they are guided by event founder and veteran Major Jas Boothe, using the competition to regain their identities and way of life that they sacrificed in foreign wars. It is an engaging and honest look at an often-unseen veteran reality.


Come and Explore the Labyrinth!

Day of Service - Thanks!

Thank you to everyone who participated in the April 7 Annual Day of Service! We had 180 church members and friends helping to make the event a success - promoting practical goodness in the world and strengthening our UUSG community. Some key accomplishments:

- 75 volunteers visited the Northern Illinois Food Bank and packaged 26,745 lbs of potatoes, fruits, vegetables, and food for the children's food backpack program.
- 23 efficient packers assembled 136 Senior Gift Bags for Humanitarian Service Project. The congregation donated approximately \$2,000 for this effort and area businesses contributed about \$150 more.
- 17 lively partygoers played BINGO with area senior citizens at Bria Health Services of Geneva.
- 6 dedicated people worked in 18 degree weather to spruce up the fence area around Mutual Ground and to hang a sign promoting Sexual Assault Awareness Month.
- 6 artistic children created cards for sick children in hospitals.
- 16 nature lovers created cards for Project Snowfall, thinking about the "interconnected web of which we are a part."
- 24 shoppers donated paper products for low-income seniors.
- 13 creative souls provided lovely School Supply kits for disadvantaged children.
- 2 helpful volunteers transported a truckload of paper products, School Supply kits and Senior Gift Bags to Humanitarian Service Project.
- 1 thoughtful volunteer who is creating welcome bags for new immigrant families using the extra toiletries and items from the Senior Gift Bag project.
- Dozens of people attended an inspiring worship service.
- 21 gracious volunteers put on a lovely dinner for 82 hungry volunteers!



New UUs ReUUnion!


