From the Pulpit the Rev. Dr. Lindsay Bates

Over the past couple of months, we've been dealing with our own version of "A Series of Unfortunate Events" here at UUSG. If you've missed the excitement, congratulations! and count your blessings. Every community, including healthy ones, will face conflicts, confusions and misunderstandings, and UUSG is no different. "Not as agreeing in opinion" is, after all, part of our Covenant. Fortunately, we're well on our way to getting issues resolved,

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problems corrected, and misunderstandings cleared up. Thank you to those who have been and are still working mostly behind the scenes long and patiently to get things back on track.

One ongoing issue that keeps appearing is that people aren't sure where to go when they have a concern, a question, or a problem within the community. We do in fact have a structure, and when it's used appropriately, it can defuse and heal trouble before trouble gets out of hand.

First, ideally, we hope each member of our UUSG community will be willing to go directly to any other member of the community – clergy, staff, Board, Council leaders, other members of the community – and be willing to say "I have a concern, and you – your project, your team, your comments, etc. – are involved. Could we sit down together and talk?"

If that doesn't work, then

Second, everyone should know that MOM – our Ministry on Ministries team – exists to help connect individuals or groups having problems (including but not restricted to failed communications, lack of clarity around roles or expectations, concerns about policies or events or behaviors witnessed, conflicts of any kind) with the individuals or groups who can help get those problems solved. MOM is a neutral, unbiased group, part of whose job is to make sure that the clergy hear clearly what

people are saying to us! Sometimes MOM will facilitate meetings, sometimes MOM just passes along important information and follows up to see that it's handled appropriately. This can take time, and it does require patience. But it works.

MOM members are Bev Coe, Sean Hruby, Patrick McGleam, Ellie Radvanovsky, Pat Ward, Molly MacKay Zacker, Board Liaison Gail Tattersfield, and our clergy, Rev. Lindsay and Rev. Scott. You can approach any one of them, or ask to talk with the whole group. You can ask a member to hold your name in confidence while taking a concern to the group on your behalf. MOM generally meets on the first Sunday of the month after the second service.

And Third, any member of the community can approach any member of the Board of Directors and ask that your concern be addressed. If it's an issue of policies in particular, the Board is likely to be the best place to start. Board members are President Jean Pierce, VPs Nancy Christensen and Eric Jonke, Secretary Pat Vary, Treasurer Bob Swanson, Directors Kathy Cornell, David Moore and Gail Tattersfield, and our two ministers ex officio. The Board meets on the second Tuesday of the month at 7 PM. Talk with Jean Pierce to find out if your issue is best responded to by an individual conversation or a place on the agenda.

Of course, things won't always work

out the way everyone wants them to – that's also inevitable in even the healthiest communities. Sometimes you'll be told, "Sorry, but no," along with an explanation. Sometimes information you may want is confidential (the workings of the Personnel Committee, the Board's Executive Sessions). Sometimes what is being requested isn't permitted by policy, law or common sense. Some issues are decided by vote, and sometimes we don't get the outcome we wanted or expected.

But even when we don't agree, we do promise to listen, to take concerns seriously, to trust and be trustworthy, to work together and to do what we can to overcome divisions and establish real harmony. It's all part of "aiding each other in our moral and religious improvement," being associated together "as seekers after truth and goodness."

Remember the words of our Universalist ancestor, Hosea Ballou:

If we agree in love, there is no disagreement that can do us any injury, but if we do not, no other agreement can do us any good.

Sources say that near half a million people were in attendance for the Women's March on D.C. on January 21st. Across the country and around the world additional marchers may have numbered in the millions. Estimates from the organizers of the Chicago event have set attendance at a quarter of a million. A number of you were in The Loop on Saturday and most of us were there in spirit.

The myth of American exceptionalism dies hard. For me it's always a delicate balance between harsh reality and the beauty of the American ideal that we are all equal under the law. We all have different reactions to disappointment. Some people feel sorrowful and disheartened; I just feel mad. Mad that the forces that divide us momentarily have the upper-hand. Unity and community won't come easy in the forthcoming days, but have they ever? It takes talent and patience to keep the conversation going. It takes grit and tenacity to attain greater goals, and once reached, still loftier ones will be the inspiration to future generations.

Equally alive in my soul is the dream of Unitarian Universalist exceptionalism. Most religions retain some sort of exclusivity: "Be like us"; "Think like us"; "Do like us" and sometimes even "Do as we say!" We say "Come as you are!" Every community has shifting dynamics of power and individuals who think they have the privilege of telling others how it must be. Historically UUs have said "NO" to that way of behaving and complications result. Our luminaries, many of whom are counted among the luminaries of our nation, had the ability to work in solidarity for the greater good, and not always harmoniously.

Come as you are and stay to create something lasting, beautiful and exemplary. That takes patience, largess and magnanimity, but we can do it!

Recently, I shared my belief that the Unitarian Universalist Society of Geneva has an aspirational covenant. Rev. Conant and his contemporaries framed that abiding agreement of what our church should strive for, but perhaps never attain. Our 175th year is a grand opportunity for us to take stock of how we're doing. Ours is a legacy of high-mindedness and vision; let's resolve to stay true to our ideals.

* "This is not a moment, it's a MOVEMENT."

* Seeing a white man hold up on his shoulders a young black girl was very symbolic to me.

* White woman wearing "Black Lives Matter" T-shirt.

* Marching with men and women of all ages, shapes, and sizes with the most creative signage ever and chanting, "No hate, No fear. Immigrants are welcome here."

* The number of young people, male and female, willing to give their time and energy to stand for diversity, justice, and equality.

* The crowd of 250,000 was so inspiring. They were upbeat, kind, and concerned about one another. There was no violence.

* Seeing the platform at the Geneva station covered with a sea of women in pink hats.

* The clapping of the women on the train as we stopped to pick up crowds from each stop until we were so full we had to go express.

* The incredible energy of the train set the tone of the day. Everyone was so friendly. Not one grouchy moment. True diversity of the crowd represented all of us in America, and all were welcomed and included. Police officers were friendly and welcoming and train conductors were helpful and supportive.

* Even the male conductor sported a "Nasty Woman" badge.

* The sun peeked out behind the clouds as I embarked on the train and remained bright and warming - brought light to the day - to the cause.

* Looking into the eyes of another marcher - a man - while he responded to a woman's chant of "My body. My choice." He and other men responded with "Her body. Her choice." I was brought to tears hearing him say, "Her body. Her choice."

* I spoke about the march with a young man today. He told me that he had to work that day. But he wore a pint t-shirt to support us. We are an even bigger majority than we know.

* The absolute lack of testosterone ~ Everyone was kind, helpful, and loving.


* The signs - creative and blunt; e.g. a uterus giving the finger!




What's New at New2U




Winter Weather Closing Policy

Because we're a regional congregation, with many of our folks traveling a considerable distance to get to Geneva, we do have a policy for winter weather.

If the wind chill in the greater Chicago area is colder than 40 degrees below zero, or if travel advisories have been issued because of snow or wind, we cancel all church events, including any committee meetings, office hours, Sunday morning religious education, and Sunday worship. During the week, if you're not sure about the severity of the weather, please check with your group's facilitator before heading to a meeting.

If Sunday activities are canceled, we'll try to get that information onto our website and the Congregational Administrator's voicemail message (call the church office at 630-232-2350 and then press 1-0-0 to hear the message). But when in doubt, please stay home!

Friday Flick's - From this Day Forward Friday, February 24, 2017 at 7:00pm UUSG Common Room

From This Day Forward is a moving portrayal of an American family coping with the most intimate of transformations. When filmmaker Sharon Shattuck's artist father came out as transgender and changed her name to Trisha, her transition was difficult for her straight-identified, physician wife, Marcia, to accept. Having married and fallen in love with a man, Marcia found herself doubting whether she could love Trisha as a woman. And, as a heterosexual woman, she felt that the idea of walking down the street, holding hands with a woman, would paint a false picture of her own identity. At the time, with Sharon in her preteen years and focused on developing her own sense of self, her parents' relationship seemed a mystery.

After announcing that they would get a divorce, Marcia and Trisha found themselves heartbroken and decided that they loved each other too much to separate. Committed to staying together as a family, they then began a careful balancing act that would test their love for one another, and ultimately prove even more challenging than expected.

As Sharon approaches her own wedding day, she begins asking the questions she couldn't ask as a child: Why did her father choose to transition when she and her sister were so young? How—and why—did her parents decide to stay together? As the film evolves into a conversation about love and acceptance in a modern American family, it raises questions relevant to all of us: As individuals, how do we adapt to sustain long-term love and relationships? Where do sexuality and gender intersect? And how do families stay together, when external forces are pulling them apart?

This showing is sponsored by Interweave which is a local group of LGBTQ members, friends and allies who meet once a month to have time together for discussions and special events. It is part of our annual events leading up to the Interweave church service on Sunday March 5.
