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From the Pulpit the Rev. Dr. Lindsay Bates

I've begun the process of clearing out nearly 4 decades of files, and I came across this "Paper Pulpit" from 2006. It seems to be relevent still...

We're now well over half-way through Lent, a time of reflection and sacrifice in the Christian tradition. Too many of us distrust that Lenten discipline, thinking that "sacrifice" means "to give something up" – but it doesn't. "Sacrifice" is from the Latin – *sacer* (holy) and *facere* (to make) – and so it really

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means "to make holy," to transform something mundane into something of transcendent value, to take that which is ordinary or taken for granted and turn it into something that gets God's attention, that says to the Mystery of our lives, "Take this – take this thing of mine – my possession, my action, my life - and use it to change me, to change and to heal and to save the world." Sacrifice, then, is not about giving up something one wants for oneself - it is about being generous with what one has for the sake of a larger vision of a greater good.

We're also more than half-way through our Annual Canvass, another time of reflection and, yes, frankly, of sacrifice. Do we really want to make a difference in the world? Then we need to be willing also to give enough to make a difference. Church consultant Michael Durall, who is a UU and understands full well our tendencies as religious liberals to be, to put it charitably, fiscal conservatives (if not regressives), has written:

...If giving to your congregation is similar to writing a check at the end of the month to pay the phone bill or the electric bill, and then forgetting about it until the end of the next month, you are not giving enough. Similarly, if you take spare change or a dollar or two from your pocket or purse for the weekly collection and never notice the difference, your giving has too little meaning either for you or for your church.

We should notice that we're doing something, if what we are doing is in

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fact worth while. We should be giving enough to challenge us to look at our own deepest values, and to feel that we are being true to what we say we hold most dear. Our Pledge Drive challenges us to look at what we think about generosity. It challenges us to think about what transcendent goods are worth a sacrifice – a making holy – of our limited resources. And the money we promise to give should be going out from us not out of guilt or dreary obligation, but out of gratitude, joy, even love.

Money itself is a neutral reality – it takes on meaning as it becomes one of the means through which we send our selves out into the world. What does your money mean? Do you regard it as a means to a life of ease, affluence, indulgence? Or is it a means to the ends of deepening your life, strengthening your faith, changing the world?

The existence of the free church — not the church that runs without money (there's no such thing), but the church that is truly free, where you are encouraged and supported in your own quest for your own true self and where you join with others who share your greater vision of the kind of community, the kind of world you want for yourself and for those you love and for those you don't even know — the existence of the free church is not guaranteed.

But if we want such a church, for ourselves and for our children and for generations still to come, we can have it. It is ours to dream and create; it is our responsibility and our

privilege to dream it and create it and sustain it together, with gratitude and with joy.

To those who have pledged as generously as they can, blessings and thanks. To those who have not pledged, or who could in fact pledge more, please consider what sort of church – what sort of world – you really want.

And to all – as always – Peace!

Annual Day of Service Thank You

Thank you to everyone who participated in the March 18 Annual Day of Service! We had our largest participation yet, with 180 church members and friends helping to make the event a success performing more than 450 hours of public service and strengthening our UUSG community! Some key accomplishments:

- 72 volunteers visited the Northern Illinois Food Bank and packaged 33,834 lbs of potatoes and senior food boxes.
- 21 efficient packers assembled 134 Senior Gift Boxes for Humanitarian Service Project. The congregation donated nearly \$2000 for this effort, and area businesses contributed about \$400 more.
- 17 lively party-goers played BINGO with area senior citizens at Bria Health Services of Geneva.
- 9 dedicated painters spruced up a hallway and rooms at Mutual Ground to welcome clients to the women's shelter. Some were so dedicated that they returned on Monday for a second coat!
- 20 shoppers donated paper products for low-income seniors.
- 23 creative souls provided lovely Birthday Party in a Box kits for disadvantaged children.
- 17 concerned citizens wrote 133 postcards and letters to their

- representatives in government on behalf of the "interconnected web of which we are a part."
- 3 inspired leaders put on a lovely, uplifting worship service which several dozen attended.
- 20 gracious volunteers put on a lovely dinner for 65 hungry volunteers!




WOW: Is It The Team For You?




Foxfire Pan Pagan Earth Circle

Friday Flicks - Before the Flood

Friday, April 28, 2017 at 7pm UUSG Common Room

Before the Flood, presented by National Geographic, features Leonardo DiCaprio on a journey as a United Nations Messenger of Peace, traveling to five continents and the Arctic to witness climate change firsthand. He goes on expeditions with scientists uncovering the reality of climate change and meets with political leaders fighting against inaction. He also discovers a calculated disinformation campaign orchestrated by powerful special interests working to confuse the public about the urgency of the growing climate crisis. With unprecedented access to thought leaders around the world, DiCaprio searches for hope in a rising tide of catastrophic news.

From Academy Award®-winning filmmaker Fisher Stevens and Academy Award®-winning actor, environmental activist and U.N. Messenger of Peace Leonardo DiCaprio, *Before the Flood* presents a riveting account of the dramatic changes now occurring around the world due to climate change, as well as the actions we as individuals and as a society can take to prevent the disruption of life on our planet. Beyond the steps we can take as individuals, the film urges viewers to push their elected officials in supporting the use of alternative energy sources such as solar and wind power. "We need everyone to demand bold action from their political leaders and to elect representatives who have their best interests at heart, not the interests of corporations to perpetuate a cycle of greed and destruction," says DiCaprio. "This documentary shows how interconnected the fate of all humanity is — but also the power we all possess as individuals to build a better future for our planet."




The Office Report
