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From the Pulpit the Rev. Dr. Lindsay Bates

Without a doubt, the most poignant questions that come to us - whether through the Question Box sermon or newcomers' gatherings or over the Internet or in pastoral conversations - are the ones that ask, May I come in? Do I have a place here? When you say everyone is welcome and "Come as you are" and "Welcome to This House," do you mean me, too? I can't give to the pledge drive, I can't participate in events, I'm gay or lesbian or bisexual or

transgender or gender fluid or unsure, I'm a Republican, a Libertarian, a Tea Party supporter, I'm still Christian, I'm still Jewish, I'm really a Buddhist, I'm one of those "nones," I'm too old, my kids are too young, I never went to college, I have a job instead of a career, I look too different, I sound too different, I feel too different. Would you welcome me?

I tried to answer that on the 15th, when one of its many versions came up to the pulpit with the "Stump the Ministers" questions. I hope I responded adequately. All I really said, though, was Yes.

We mean it when we say "Welcome to this house." Every person who wants to be part of our UUSG community is wanted here. We seek quite intentionally to be a community in which all who seek a place will be able to find one. We want to be the kind of community we believe the world needs to see and to create more of, in other institutions and neighborhoods and towns and cities and nations. The motivational line is "Be the change you want to see." That's what we're about. If we won't do it, we've no moral grounds for urging such an approach upon others. If we can't do it, then where is the hope for the world?

So we do our best, working to create in our small community the world of respect and compassion and acceptance that we long to see on a larger scale. That doesn't mean that you will always feel perfectly comfortable here. You'll hear ideas that challenge your beliefs. You'll meet some people who are not at all like you. People will sometimes say unfortunate things, act in less than compassionate ways, forget the intricacies of the Golden Rule (a challenging imperative if ever there was one). We're a human community, we have yet to achieve perfection, and besides, "not as agreeing in opinion" is part of our Covenant, too.

But I can promise that if you want to be here, you have a place here. Come as you are. You are welcome in this House.

What objects mean, rather than what they are...

As I ask myself these questions, our home is rapidly becoming a reflection of who Tony and I are. We love it and how beautiful our possessions look in and around it. "This house is a dream come true." Tony said this morning. Immediate neighbors on each side introduced themselves within minutes of our unlocking the front door for the very first time, how gracious.

We love our Oak Park dentist, general practitioner and barber, so we can't give them up. But we'll be needing recommendations on just about everything else; a fast and inexpensive cleaner; a garden center; handypersons and mechanics. We welcome advice and suggestions, but we probably won't get to all the good restaurants for a long, long time. We love our new community and are so happy that UUSG and all of its wonderful people are at the heart of it.

boardblog: Our Commitment to be a Welcoming Congregation

This is a great time to be involved at UUSG. This is the first full year we have Scott on staff to offer new ideas for children, youth and adult programming. We have new energy showing up in our music programs and the increased use of video in our Sunday services. This year will feature the Follies and our biennial auction fund drive which are always great fun events.

It also has been very inspiring to see the vibrant growth of the Interweave program at UUSG. In addition to special social events during the year, Interweave provides a group gathering once a month for LGBTQ members, friends, and allies. Through publicity and word of mouth the group has broadened to bring into the UUSG community a number of participants looking for a place that is truly welcoming and geared to meet their needs.

Now UUSG is launching a new program by having a drop-in center sponsored by Youth Outlook meet at our church twice a month. After starting the program this May and meeting through the summer, the new program may be able to expand the meeting times this fall once additional adults are trained to be sponsors at our site. Many people involved with Interweave will complete that training and help ensure that our new drop-in center will have enough adults to keep the program offered here for months and years to come.

In addition to these programs, <u>PFLAG</u> (parents and friends of lesbians and gays, which also has programs for bisexual and transgender persons) is interested in moving the Aurora/Fox Valley chapter meetings to the Tri-City area. If room is available, that chapter may be moving to UUSG later this year as well. So in total that would result in three groups, each with a different focus, meeting at UUSG with the purpose of meeting the needs of LGBTQ persons and their families, friends and allies, both within our walls and in our greater community. We set out to be a Welcoming

Congregation in 1999 and then took that commitment to a higher level with the UUA designation five years ago. Now we are demonstrating that our type of welcoming is more than just acting nice and kind. We are showing that UUSG is committed to living our values in sharing our time, talent, and support for this unmet need in our community.

Friday Flick: "Making a Killing: Guns, Greed, and the NRA"

Due to Swedish Days, there will be no 4th Friday Flick in June. "Making a Killing," which will be shown in July, is an unabashedly unbalanced look at the costs of gun ownership to our society. The NRA spent more than \$27 million on congressional races in 2014, according to opensecrets.org, which monitors political lobbying. In recent years the guns and ammunition industry had estimated revenues of more than \$11 billion annually. The documentary notes that one person in the U.S. is killed with a gun every 16 minutes and that 92% of Americans favor background checks on all gun buyers.



UUSG Turns 175!

Seems like only yesterday it was 1842 and we were a religiously diverse group of Geneva settlers, no more than a couple dozen folk, signing our assent to the original Covenant of the First Christian Congregation of Geneva. Now we're looking at our 175th Anniversary in June 2017.

Interweave is a local group of LGBTQ members, friends, and allies who meet once a month to have time together for discussions and special events.


Interweave will not meet in May but will have their annual Pride Month Picnic on June 12, after the church service.
