I'm in beautiful San Diego on study leave at the convention of the Liberal Religious Educator's Association (LREDA). It is lovely to be here with 167 religious educators, both ministers and laypersons. It IS wonderful but also a challenge. Over the 4 days we've done Soul Work around the issues of money, death, race and sexuality. These are about the most complicated and emotional subjects we are asked to respond to as people of faith. Yet being among these warm and protective people feels like one of the most embracing environments I remember encountering.

For many of us the topic of sexuality was the most loaded and concerning. As Rev. Sarah Lammert, Director of Ministries and Faith Development at the UUA reminded us today, "In the era of California v. Brock Allan Turner and nominee 'locker-room talk', the questions of sexuality and ethical conduct has rarely been so important." And I agree with Rev. Lammert that the Our Whole Lives (OWL) human sexuality program "Is perhaps the most important thing we do." The OWL program is one of the signature programs of our church's Religious Education program, and one I hope we'll have the volunteers and enthusiasm to expand, sometime soon. For now the OWL parent information meeting is scheduled for November 15th. This is an opportunity for parents of youth in 7th-9th grade to find out more about the OWL program and consider whether or not they want their children to participate in this esteemed program.

In our conversations today, we religious educators testified to the life-and-love-affirming program that OWL offers our youth. Though we agree that parents are the ultimate sex educators, the OWL program makes it less awkward for parents and their kids to talk about sex! For many, OWL is a starting place for kids to talk with parents about the stuff that really matters. The 25 sessions go in depth on the many significant aspects of love and human intimacy with sensitivity, wisdom, candor and competence. In this first half of November, I hope you'll take the time to talk with me about the OWL program, both as we

offer it at UUSG and its many other aspects. (Ask me and win a prize!)

#### Hello All!

I joined the UUSG Board of Directors as a Vice President in July. When I agreed to be on the Board, I, of course, had to ask myself what I hoped to accomplish as a Board member. That was a difficult question for me, because I have little experience with the inner workings of this church. And, I had little desire to get involved in that experience. =)

As you may know, I am a YRUU advisor and coordinator of the Youth Habitat for Humanity trip each summer. I also teach chemistry at a community college. My 'calling', if I have one, is to work with the youth, as a mentor, role-model, and a safe adult in their lives. It is an amazing experience to work with the youth and it helps me to feel good about the future. From a distance, the youth of our nation seem like helpless, self-centered children. Up close, they are thinkers and fighters and carers and movers and shakers. They care deeply about issues that affect their lives and their friends' lives. They are spread too thin in their lives, just like a lot of us, and so sometimes seem not wholly committed to their causes. Our job, as adults in our congregation, in my opinion, is to meet them where they are and then push a little from the back or drag a little from the front. They want to improve their world and are learning about ways to make changes. The beauty of working with them is that I learn they are not as

jaded as we are or cynical about their futures. They are still focused on the joys in their lives and work to maximize that.

I am very appreciative of the safe space we make for youth in our church. Our YRUU is a place where all youth and, notably, the LGBTQ youth are welcomed and supported in a community of love and honesty. We all know that many of these youth may not be welcome in the church in which they grew up and sometimes even in their own families. I am proud of our UUSG community and its welcoming congregation status and what it means to youth, especially.

As a member of your Board, I have invited the youth to be members of the Board and now we have five youth who act as alternating, ex-officio members of the Board. Our goal, (the youth and advisors of the group) is to have their presence at the Board meetings be a reminder of their presence in the church and their importance to the future of us all. Also, we believe it is important for the youth to be aware of the inner workings of the Church and for the youth to realize that there are many committed adults that make what we do in the basement and on our trip in the summer possible. Our youth dress a little strange sometimes, color their hair strange colors oftentimes, act a little obnoxiously many times, and care about their world and the humans around them all the time. I urge you to sometime say hello to one of those groups of kids standing around at the coffee time. When you're at the Food Bank and one of them is there, work at a table with them. If there's an activity where they are there, work to sit with one of them and ask them about their lives. It's not that different from your life, really. They are just trying to make a difference in the world.


## **Welcome Our New Board Director, Eric Jonke!**

# **UUSG Annual Thanksgiving Dinner!**


