The air conditioning unit that services the offices and classrooms died last month and was replaced. The new unit cost \$4000. Fortunately, our property insurance covered \$1500 of that \$4000, thanks to Christine!

The curtains and ribbons on the chancel were changed, thanks to Sherri Casterline, Tom Lichtenheld, and George Tattersfield.

George Tattersfield also repaired the door stops on the sanctuary doors. Amazing what a little WD-40 can do.

The exterior trim on the sanctuary was repaired and painted, thanks to Tom Lichtenheld who coordinated the project!

In addition, Tom Lichtenheld was responsible for coordinating and completing several other projects, including: 1) getting window well covers installed (now the rain and snow won't leak into the basement); 2) switching the name tag holders in the vestibule of the sanctuary so that the name tags now face people as they enter; 3) replacing the door stop on the heritage room exterior doors, and 4) persistently looking for ways to fill the gap between the two exterior sanctuary doors to stop the cold

winter draft from coming into the sanctuary!

In the coming week Ron Craig will do an exterior inspection of the Sanctuary, Pioneer House and the Common Room. He will also be leading an effort to inventory all the extra paint we have collected from various painting projects over the years.

The Facilities Team has many handyman projects to complete, so if you or someone you know is able to replace a door, paint a wall, or apply WD40 on an old hinge, then please contact the <u>Facilities Team</u>. It takes a village to maintain our house.

Statement about Interim Ministry

The purpose of interim ministry is to help the congregation prepare for change. Ninety percent of UU congregations that prepare for a search to call a new settled minister first engage in interim ministry. Especially following a long settled ministry, it is essential that the congregation have a period of time to decide together how we will do the work of the church in the world.

The UUSG Board of Directors plans to engage in interim ministry for the

period of 2018-2020. It is expected the interim ministry process will follow guidelines and principles published by Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA). Specific plans and procedures will be made with the input and guidance of the interim minister.

It is understood, in accordance with established policy of the UUA, that the interim minister is pledged not to become a candidate for called ministry, not to serve the congregation for more than two years, and not to discuss prospective candidates for called ministry with the search committee. It is also understood that interim ministers carry out the normal responsibilities of congregational ministry, including worship and pastoral care, and assist the congregation in addressing the following interim tasks:

- Claiming and honoring its past; engaging and acknowledging its grief and conflicts
- Recognizing its unique identity and its strengths, needs, and challenges
- Understanding the appropriate leadership roles of minister(s), church staff, and lay leaders and navigating the shifts in leadership that may accompany times of transition
- Making appropriate use of regional, UUA, and other outside resources
- Renewing its vision, strengthening its stewardship, preparing for new growth and new professional leadership, ready to embrace the future with anticipation and zest

Friday Flicks

This month's Friday Flicks Presentation: *Immigration Battle* Friday, October 27, 2017 at 7:00pm UUSG Common Room

Join us as we return, once again, to an issue which seemed to be making some movement to resolution only to be resurrected in a much darker form in 2017. October's Friday Flick, *Immigration Battle*, was produced in 2015 and looked at the legislative process that failed, at that time, to produce a comprehensive reform bill on immigration.

Why has it been so hard for Washington to fix our country's broken immigration system? In *Immigration Battle*, a 2-hour film from Frontline and Independent Lens, independent filmmakers Shari Robertson and Michael Camerini take viewers behind closed doors in Washington's corridors of power to explore political realities surrounding one of the country's most pressing and divisive issues.

In *Immigration Battle* we follow Rep. Luis Gutierrez (D-IL) as he works behind the scenes with congressional leaders and the White House to try to create a bill that would be acceptable to both Republicans and Democrats. Interestingly, the film makers conclude that Republicans weren't the only ones to blame for the failure to pass an immigration bill.

Youth Outlook Drop-In Center Is Back!

After taking the summer off to do some outreach to the local middle and high schools, the bi-monthly Thursday drop-in center for LGBT youth opens September 28, at 6:30pm. Through July and August, the drop-in center volunteers worked to create new outreach materials and developed a new list of contacts, focused on Tri-City middle school social workers and counselors who would be the most likely professionals to make referrals for youth seeking support.

In its first year, the drop-in center served a mix of LGBT youth, with a high percentage of trans and gender non-binary students. In the coming year, all LGBT youth are welcome.

Adults volunteers who would like to assist with running the drop-in center may want to consider the upcoming November volunteer training, scheduled for November 4, 11, and 18. "Can't the Welcoming Team come up with a better approach?"


"I can't commit to three Sunday afternoons in a row!"

Green Sanctuary Team would like you to know about upcoming events for the public:


